Poverty & Income	<i>Employment (16-64 working age group)</i>	69.7%		In the year to Jun 2024, 359,900 people were estimated to be employed in Leeds, at a rate of 69.7% of the working age population. This was just below the national rate of 75.4%. Employment levels in Leeds have fallen since Apr-Mar 2023 when the rate was 76.4%.	21/01/2025
	<i>Modelled Unemployment (16+ age group)</i>	3.5%		In the year to Jun 2024, 13,400 people were estimated to be unemployed in Leeds, at a rate of 3.5%. This was below the national rate of 4.3%. This is one of its lowest rates both nationally and locally and is lower than its pre pandemic rate of 4.3% in Dec 2019.	21/01/2025
	<i>UC claimants</i>	93,608		93,608 people claimed UC in Leeds in Oct 2024. The number of UC claimants has increased by 1.5% since Aug 2024 and is up 18.4% since Oct 2023. The provisional figure for November 2024 is showing that there were 96,239 UC claimants in Leeds.	21/01/2025
	<i>UC Claimants in work</i>	37%	N/A	63% of claimants to UC were not in work, and 37% - 34,657 Leeds claimants were in-work in Oct 2024.	21/01/2025
	<i>Real Living Wage</i>	£12.60		From Apr 2025, the Real Living Wage for outside of London is £12.60 per hour. The National Living Wage for people over 21 is £12.21 per hour. In Leeds, the median average wage is £15.43. 51,377 residents earned below the RLW in 2024.	November 2025
Housing	<i>Housing Affordability Ratio</i>	6.78		With data to Sept 2023, Leeds house prices averaged £230,000 and wages averaged £34k it cost the average full-time Leeds resident almost 7 times their income to afford a house. Although a slight dip from 6.80 in Sept 2022, this is one of the highest ratios for Leeds on record, and an indication of wages not keeping pace with house prices.	March 2025
	<i>Evictions</i>	222		By Q3 2024 (Jul-Sept) there were 76 more evictions in Leeds, taking the total YTD figure to 222. This is a 46% increase by the same period in 2022.	Feb 2025
	<i>Welfare Rights Unit</i>	216		In Dec 2025, 216 benefit checks were made by the WRU, up from 215 in Dec 2024.	Feb 2025
Advice & Support	<i>CAB enquiries</i>	48,511		In the YTD to Q2 2024/25, total enquiries increased by 39.1%; from 34,872 by Q2 2023/24 to 48,511 in Q2 2024/25.	Jan/Feb 2025
	<i>Food parcels</i>	81,959		In 2023/24, 81,959 food parcels were given out informally. This is up 21% on the previous year.	Jun/Jul 2025

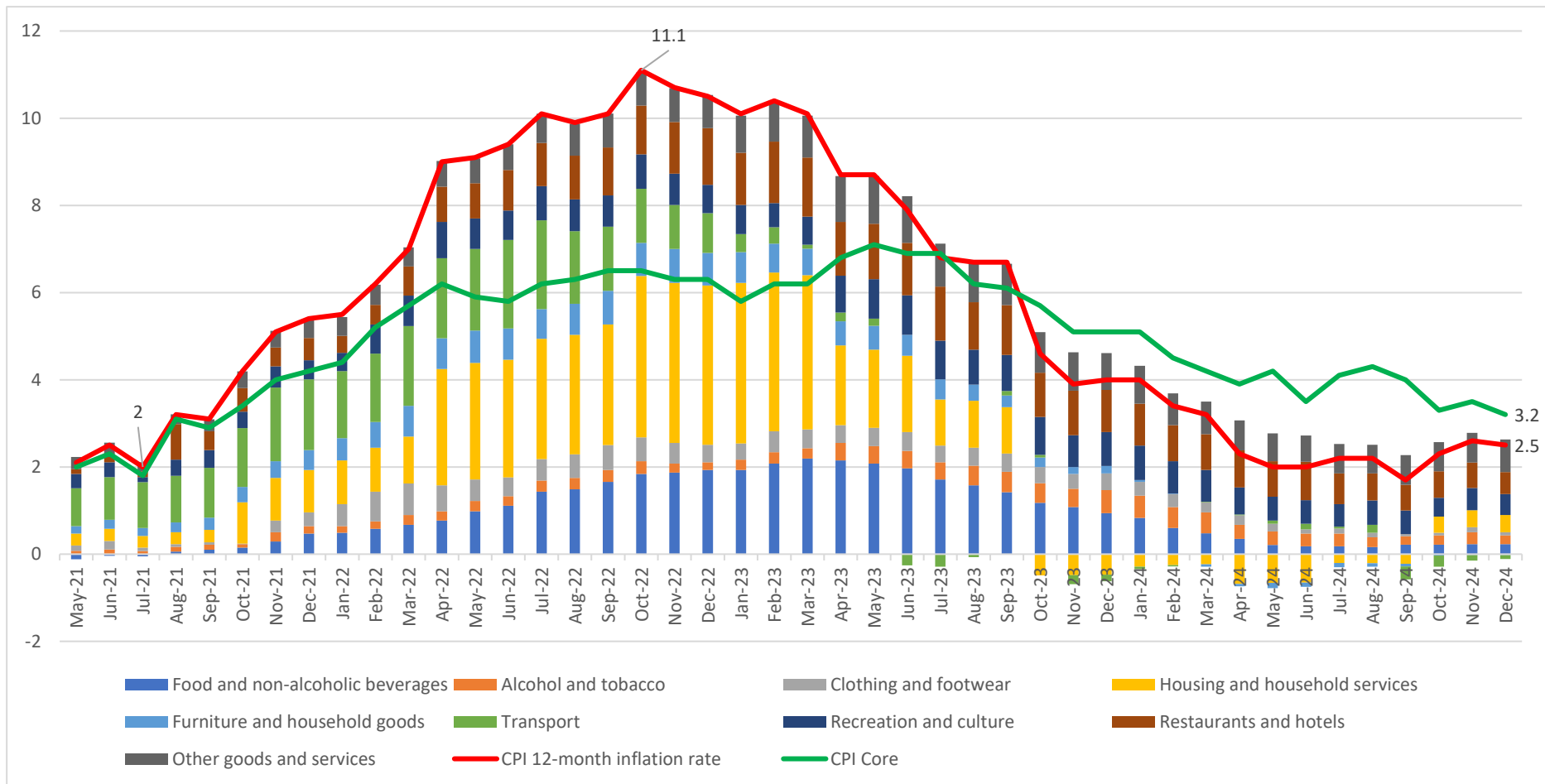

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## Timeline of the Cost-of-Living Crisis

The Government target is to maintain inflation at 2%. This timeline graph displays key impacts on prices during the cost-of-living crisis. July 2021 coincides with Covid Lockdown rules easing and more spaces starting to reopen. From that point, supply and demand issues in the global economy, affecting fuel prices and food supplies started to push up prices and the cost-of-living crisis began to take effect, with inflation exceeding 2% and peaking at 11.1% in October 2022.
