

Inflation	CPI inflation	2.6%	1	UK CPI Inflation was 2.6% in Mar 2025, down from 2.8% in Feb 2025. The largest downward contribution to the monthly change in CPI annual rates came from recreation and culture, and motor fuels.	21/05/2025
	Food inflation	3.0%	1	Food inflation was 3.0% in the 12 months to Mar 2025, down from 3.3% from the previous month. There was a small downward effect from confectionery, where prices fell this year but rose a year ago. This was partially offset by a small upward effect from milk, cheese and eggs.	21/05/2025

This was up from 69.6% in the previous quarter (Sept 2024) and below the national rate of 75.5%. Employment levels in Leeds have fallen since Apr-Mar 2023 when the rate was 76.4%.	17/07/2025
	Modelled Unemployment (16+ age group)	3.0%	1	In the year to Dec 2024, 11,800 people were estimated to be unemployed in Leeds, at a rate of 3.0%. This was below the national rate of 3.8%. This is one of its lowest rates both nationally and locally and is lower than its pre pandemic rate of 4.3% in Dec 2019.	17/07/2025
	UC claimants	98,731	û	98,731 people claimed UC in Leeds in Feb 2025. The number of UC claimants has increased by 1.6% from the previous month and is up 16% since Feb 2024. The provisional figure for Mar 2025 is showing that there were 100,805 UC claimants in Leeds.	13/05/2025
	UC Claimants in work	34%	N/A	66% of claimants to UC were not in work, and 34% - 33,560 Leeds claimants were in-work in Feb 2025.	13/05/2025
	Real Living Wage	£12.60	Û	From Apr 2025, the Real Living Wage for outside of London is £12.60 per hour. The National Living Wage for people over 21 is £12.21 per hour. In Leeds, the median average wage is £15.43. 51,377 residents earned below the RLW in 2024.	November 2025
Housing	Housing Affordability Ratio	6.78	1	With data to Sept 2023, Leeds house prices averaged £230,000 and wages averaged £34k it cost the average full-time Leeds resident almost 7 times their income to afford a house. Although a slight dip from 6.80 in Sept 2022, this is one of the highest ratios for Leeds on record, and an indication of wages not keeping pace with house prices.	May 2025
	Evictions	222	1	By Q3 2024 (Jul-Sept) there were 76 more evictions in Leeds, taking the total YTD figure to 222. This is a 46% increase by the same period in 2022.	May 2025

### **Timeline of the Cost-of-Living Crisis**

The Government target is to maintain inflation at 2%. This timeline graph displays key impacts on prices during the cost-of-living crisis. July 2021 coincides with Covid Lockdown rules easing and more spaces starting to reopen. From that point, supply and demand issues in the global economy, affecting fuel prices and food supplies started to push up prices and the cost-of-living crisis began to take effect, with inflation exceeding 2% and peaking at 11.1% in October 2022.



The next bulletin is due on 21<sup>st</sup> May to coincide with the next inflation release.
