Inflation	CPI inflation	3.6%		UK CPI Inflation was 3.6% in June. Transport, particularly motor fuels, made the largest upward contribution to the monthly change.	20/08/2025
	Food inflation	4.5%		Food inflation was 4.5% in the 12 months to June 2025, up from 4.4% from the previous month. This was the third consecutive increase in the rate. It is the highest recorded since February 2024.	20/08/2025
	Bank Rate	4.25%		Bank rate was 4.25% in June 2025, down from 4.5% the previous month.	07/08/2025
Fuel	Petrol (ppl)	134p		Average price of petrol was down by 58p in the week commencing 14 th July from its peak in Jul 2022.	Weekly
	Diesel (ppl)	141p		Average price of diesel was down by 58p in the week commencing 14 th July from its peak in Jul 2022.	Weekly
	Energy price cap	£1,720		Between 1 July and 30 September 2025, the energy price cap is set at £1,720 per year for a typical household who use electricity and gas and pay by Direct Debit. This is a decrease of 7% compared to the cap set between 1 April to 30 June 2025 (£1,849).	27/08/2025
Poverty & Income	Employment (16-64 working age group)	70.7%		In the year to Dec 2024, 364,700 people were estimated to be employed in Leeds, at a rate of 70.7% of the working age population. This was up from 69.6% in the previous quarter (Sept 2024) and below the national rate of 75.5%. Employment levels in Leeds have fallen since Apr-Mar 2023 when the rate was 76.4%.	17/07/2025
	Modelled Unemployment (16+ age group)	3.0%		In the year to Dec 2024, 11,800 people were estimated to be unemployed in Leeds, at a rate of 3.0%. This was below the national rate of 3.8%. This is one of its lowest rates both nationally and locally and is lower than its pre pandemic rate of 4.3% in Dec 2019.	17/07/2025
	UC claimants	101,964		101,964 people claimed UC in Leeds in May 2025. The number of UC claimants has increased by 15% since May 2024.	12/08/2025
	UC Claimants in work	33%	N/A	67% of claimants to UC were not in work, and 33.4% - 34,056 Leeds claimants were in-work in May 2025.	12/08/2025
	Real Living Wage	£12.60		From Apr 2025, the Real Living Wage for outside of London is £12.60 per hour. The National Living Wage for people over 21 is £12.21 per hour. In Leeds, the median average wage is £15.43. 51,377 residents earned below the RLW in 2024.	November 2025
Housing	Housing Affordability Ratio	6.46		With data to Sept 2024, Leeds house prices averaged £234,500 and wages averaged £36k, it cost the average full-time Leeds resident almost 6.5 times their income to afford a house. This is the lowest ratio recorded in the last 3 years.	Mar 2026
	Evictions	83		In Q1 2025, there were 83 evictions in Leeds. This is up from Q1 2024, when there were 78 evictions.	Sept 2025
Advice & Support	Welfare Rights Unit	293		In June 2025, 293 benefit checks were made by the WRU, down from 294 in June 2024. The annual figures show that queries are down 1% from the same point last year.	Aug 2025
	CAB enquiries	97,833		In 2024/25, total enquiries increased by 29.2% to 97,833 from 75,747 enquiries in 2023/24. Enquiries on Benefits & tax credits, Universal Credit, Debt, Utilities, Housing, Consumer and Foodbanks were the most sought areas of advice.	Aug 2025
	Food parcels	81,959		In 2023/24, 81,959 food parcels were given out informally. This is up 21% on the previous year.	Aug 2025
	Household Support Fund	74,496	N/A	In Q4 2024/25, HSF supported 74,496 households across Leeds. 78% of the support was on food and 13% on energy and water. YTD households supported is 265,427.	Aug 2025

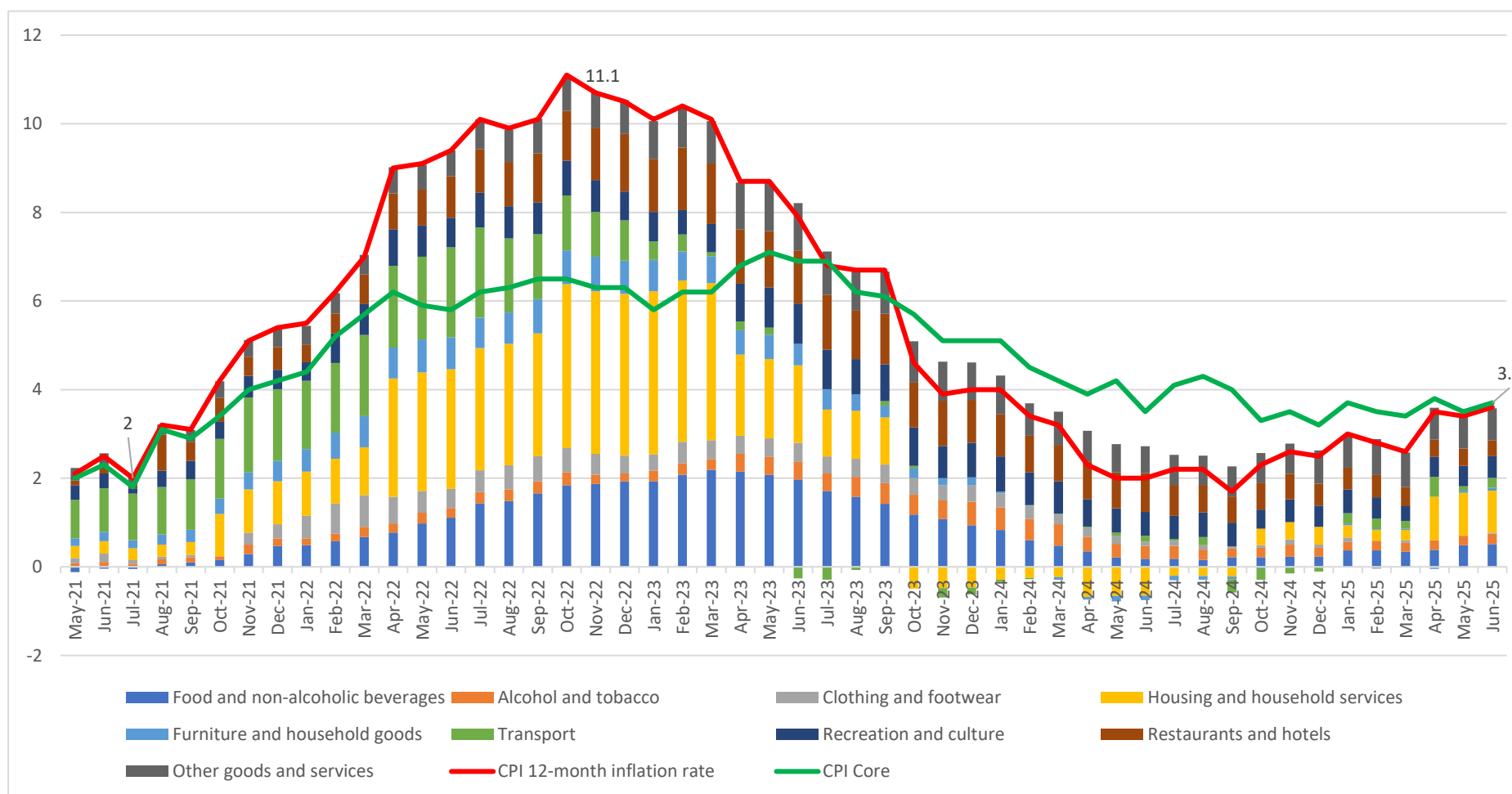

Timeline of the Cost-of-Living Crisis

The Government target is to maintain inflation at 2%. This timeline graph displays key impacts on prices during the cost-of-living crisis. July 2021 coincides with Covid Lockdown rules easing and more spaces starting to reopen. From that point, supply and demand issues in the global economy, affecting fuel prices and food supplies started to push up prices and the cost-of-living crisis began to take effect, with inflation exceeding 2% and peaking at 11.1% in October 2022.
